Studying Medicine in Oldenburg



Ossietzky University Oldenburg, our faculty - the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences (UMO) - was established in close cooperation with the University of Groningen in the Netherlands. Since then, Oldenburg has become a key center for medical training and healthcare in Northwestern Germany, shaping the future of modern medicine in the region.

What sets the UMO apart is its innovative approach to medical education. From day one, students engage with clinical and preclinical subjects simultaneously, fostering a deep understanding of medical science in real-world contexts. Research and communication training is highly valued, equipping future doctors with essential skills beyond traditional medical knowledge. The curriculum emphasizes problem-based learning, early patient contact, and interdisciplinary collaboration, ensuring that students receive hands-on experience from the very beginning of their studies.

Our Campus

The buildings in which medicine is taught at our university lie in the middle of our campus close to nature itself. The lecture halls are functional but modern and we have a newly renovated histology lab. Nonetheless, the heart of our faculty isn't labs but our clinical training center in which we have almost weekly classes, can participate in additional workshops as on suture and sonography and prepare for exams on advanced life support or else.

The rooms are also used by our several different associations as the critical med students ("Kritmeds") who organize workshops on ethically or socially interesting topics as anatomical reconstruction of female genitals after mutilation or "restart", a group that gives resuscitation classes at high schools and special need schools in Oldenburg. Research

Neurosensory, hearing and healthcare are the main areas of research at the faculty of medicine in Oldenburg, trying to interlink natural science and clinical departments.

Furthermore the potential areas of rare diseases, oncology and mobile health are pursued. Since 2019 the faculty is cooperating with the Dutch university of Groningen in form of a cross border institute of healthcare systems and prevention to extend the research's influence.

- Participating in a hands-on suture workshop




- Enhancing communication skills in an interactive workshop
